



UKCE Course Design

Basic Principles

The courses are designed to follow the communicative approach. Teachers are expected to provide practice for all skills; Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking as well teaching grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation from each unit in their coursebook – adding materials to supplement the core syllabus with regularly updated and engaging materials.

The role of coursebooks

Teachers follow the 12-week syllabus for their classes. The syllabus for the General English classes requires the teacher to use a given unit of the coursebook for a given week and provides supplementary material which addresses related language points from that unit. Teachers are free to use any extra resources and materials from course books other than the prescribed ones and the intention of the syllabus is to provide teachers with a scheme of work for coming weeks and to tie in our classes with the CEFR, not to limit the teachers. Suggested improvements to the syllabus are welcome and implemented on an ongoing basis. Where there are difficulties raised by the syllabus (for example, by a student who has completed the designated coursebook before), the Academic Registrar or Head of Studies will provide advice.

Mid Classes

Between 12:45 and 14:50 we have several supplementary classes that students can go to either singly or as a package. These are Vocabulary or Grammar and Speaking and Writing. They also cover a 12-week syllabus divided into various topics, grammar points or writing tips.

1. Future Facing
2. Achievement through quality
3. Supporting a global community
4. Commitment to the individual



These classes are provided to give students extra classes in these particular areas or to offer them alternative classes if they cannot commit to our General English classes.

Testing

We follow the principles of Continuous Assessment for Learning rather than Assessment of Learning. Students are assessed on one receptive skill every week. The assessment is followed by in-depth feedback on steps and actions students can take to improve their linguistic skills.

The results of the test and the areas of weakness should be recorded in the Student Progress file, while the assessments themselves can be returned to the students.

The assessment is in the form of a small test which focuses on one skill each week, with a weekly schedule for teachers to record the results for each of their students.

Once the assessments have been completed the teacher will mark them and give feedback to the students. The assessments are marked by 5 levels; Excellent, Very Good, Satisfactory, Needs Practice, Weak for Level. The marks are then recorded on the student progress sheet and stored in their relevant folder. Students record their own level for each test and point they could improve on for their reference and to see how they have improved.

Exam Courses: Practice exam testing every week in all 4 tests.

Tutorials

Tutorials are scheduled to take place every four weeks after enrolment. The tutorial runs through how the student feels they have progressed in particular areas and then the teacher comments on how they feel the student has progressed in the same areas based on classroom observations and their weekly assessments. The student then writes comments on classroom activities and how they improve their English outside of the classroom, before the teacher and student agree action points for further improvement, such as listening to BBC podcasts. The last part of the tutorial checks on the students welfare and anything they would like to discuss. This tutorial is then saved in a folder for teacher reference.

Continuous enrolment

The reality of continuous enrolment is acknowledged in the registration system, wherein newly- registered students only start on Monday and Tuesday (following a trial on Monday). Students are placed in classes according to the results of a grammar and a speaking placement / progress test, after consultation with the relevant teachers to make sure that they will fit with the sublevel (higher or lower end of their relevant band) of their current batch of students.

Exam Preparation Classes

Exam classes, currently IELTS, CAE and OET, are based around Exam preparation coursebooks, such as Mindset or Complete Guide to IELTS. OET is slightly different with no set coursebook but our own materials and syllabus created in-house. They look at all four skills within each



topic that may be covered in the exams. If a student wishes to enter an exam class we prefer them to be of a B2 level or higher, however exceptions are made for B1 students if a Pathway to IELTS course is not available and they do not wish to have 1:1 classes with a suitable teacher.
